TRAIL MANNERS

Good manners is the grease that helps people get along with each other, avoiding friction.

- 18 & UNDER MUST WEAR A HELMET.
- Be aware of the effect **your** actions have on others, their horses and their property.
- Do not upset your co-riders' horses.
- Ride at a quiet, controlled pace.
- NEVER PASS OTHERS AT A GALLOP.
- Keep a safe distance... don't crowd others.
- STAY WITH A DISMOUNTED RIDER
- Respect the property of others. (ie: lawns, farm fields, crops, groves, livestock, etc.)
- Leave gates as you found them: Open gates should remain open. Closed gates should remain closed.
- DO NOT PASS THE TRAIL BOSS or drop behind the drag rider.
- Stay with the trail boss on the same side of the road. Do not split the road.
- Clean up after your horse. Pick up manure or spread it depending on where you are. Do not clean your trailers out when you unload.
- NO PROFANITY AT ANY SFTR EVENTS.

REMEMBER! If you mind your manners others won't mind when you and your horse return to ride.

SFTR General Meeting - Tues. Mar. 5

Calling all SFTR to come to our General Meeting, Tues. March 5, to hear our Public Relations chairman, Ra Schooley, explain what is happening with the **State Agritourism law**. This is the hot topic which local zoning, code & police are NOT following through on. Ra spoke at our Feb. meeting & briefed us on key issues which have major negative effects on our equine community. He & some of us have attended other meetings since & there is even more info!

The venues along Krome, & proliferating throughout the Redlands, are not compliant with current laws. They are lobbying to have their bounce houses, loud music venues, ATV rentals, etc legalized. Problem then arises with increased traffic, carnivals opening next to your home (or horse pasture), closing of boarding barns to convert to these venues, etc. Additionally, farmers & other locals are having to deal with trespassing of motorized vehicles through their fields & private property – not to mention more eyes on your horses that were once secluded & safer.

As Trail Riders you should want to keep our trails open, canal-

ways accessible, & not have to deal with the influx of unregulated urban sprawl. There will always be change & growth, but turning our area into the wild west is not why we enjoy our homes & horses. **COME** to this meeting to hear first hand what is happening, how it affects us all, & what it already (and in the future) means for our horses! (see Ra's Round-up in this newsletter)

Remember, we meet on the **first Tuesday** of each month, so our next **General Meeting** will be **Tues. Mar. 5**, at the **Homestead VFW** post. The VFW is where we park for the Veteran's parade: 601 N.E. 2 Rd. (Campbell Dr./312 St. & then go south at the light at 1st Rd.; east of Krome, just west of US1). Dine **7pm**, meeting **7:30pm**- the room is spacious, the food is good & very reasonable. Bring your friends, we welcome them to come meet our great club members & hear about our up-coming calendar of events & current Agritourism affairs affecting our equines. Ride at Tropical Park in the Country Fest Event

All SFTR riders and non-riders are invited to participate as we do the opening ceremony at noon for Country Fest at Tropical Park, on **both Sat. Apr. 20 & Sun. Apr. 21**! This was previously called the Miami-Dade Cattle Show, now up-dated & in its 17th year. The SFTR for years has opened the event on the weekend, with riders & lead-line equines featuring English & Western tack. We are hoping to also have cart & wagon drivers as well! Free admission & free parking if you can participate for a couple of hours. Also free stalls, so you can stay & enjoy all the presentations.

Flag riders will enter the arena to present the colors. Then, a tribute will be given to our late friend Manny Alvarez. Following this will be all SFTR riders & those on lead-line, and driving units. Everyone *circles the arena – those riding at a faster pace (trot, canter) along the rail, and those who choose to go slower or have junior riders on lead-line may circle closer to the center of the arena. After a few circles, we stop along the arena fence to allow the public to meet our horses from the stands. Riders with a horse not tolerant of the public may exit. After circling again & our exit, we generally spend some time outside in a grass area to allow the public to bring their children up for photos. Our members explain who we are, where we*

ride, & encourage the community to help save our green spaces. You may remain mounted or with a lead-line as you represent our club, & then leave as needed. Free stalls (bring a water bucket) are available for those wanting to stay the day & watch all the shows!

We park the trailers in the back lot, & arrive early to tack-up & warm-up the horses to the venue. Restrooms available & food/ beverages for sale on site. You will need a current negative Coggins with you, to show at the rear entry gate. Juniors 18-under must wear a helmet (Fla law). Attire for all - your best western!! Tack can be English or western. This is a chance to ride a safe, big arena & thrill those who wish they could ride as we do. The SFTR Parade Team, dressed in western attire & trail tack, should volunteer for this activity & help carry flags - and ALL SFTR members who want a rare opportunity such as this are encouraged to participate, whether riding or in-hand, & carry a flag also! Remember, there will be free stalls so you can watch the other equine events for the day(s). Please **RSVP** to TB Bonny George, Jr.: 305-431-1431, so we can put your name on the entry gate list! Community service hours for juniors who wish to volunteer to help! You will receive detailed info by email prior to the event.

Emergency Management: Why Is My Horse Biting Me?

(part #2. Part 1 in Feb 2024 newsletter)

Last month we detailed some reasons a horse might bite. Until you know why your horse is biting you, there won't be an effective way for you to tackle the problem. Here is more information to train you & your horse and avoid an emergency room visit!

Aggressive Pinning- During feeding some horses are even more likely to bite, displaying food-aggression. Try to train this type of aggression out of the horse outside in the open. Put the food down on the ground & stand close to it, signaling your horse to come over. Have a lead rope ready. Your aggressive horse will pin its ears & try to close in on the food bowl. You cannot allow this type of approach, so you swing the rope. Your horse should back off. If, on the next approach, your horse is still being aggressive, swing the rope again. Make it clear you mean business by stepping toward your horse if you need to, but do not hit your horse. Repeat until your horse finally decides to stand close to the bowl with ears unpinned & a calm attitude. Then, back away from the food. At this point, there is a really good chance your horse will re-pin the ears. You don't want that, but you also don't want to chase your horse away, because on the whole, it is behaving. So, slowly & calmly, show it the rope. When it sees the rope, it should un-pin its ears. You can then let it eat. Over time, as you train aggressive behavior out of your horse at mealtimes, & be less likely to try to bite you.

Burn off excess energy - Sometimes a horse gets tired of standing in its stall, especially if it's young & has energy. So, when you let it out of its stall, it may immediately become excitable. If you then tie it to groom or do other chores, chances are good it may try to bite. Too much restrained energy. To solve this problem, burn off some of the extra energy. Give your horse something to do, moving around, following your directions, etc. Done for a few minutes, you should be able to continue with

Other reasons to bite- Horses may also bite due to lack of chewing action needed during the day. If turned out all day, the horse would do a lot of grazing. When it's in a stall, it still expects to "graze." Provide plenty of hay. If you are not offering enough hay or grass, it may feel the need to use its mouth on other surfaces. So, it may bite/others or crib. The solution is simple, make sufficient hay or grass available.

Don't encourage biting - Your own proximity or cues may be setting off your horse. If you're petting your horse without really thinking about it & he nudges you, if you do not correct that incident you are encouraging more nudging. With horses, nudging can rapidly progress to nibbling & biting. Big mistake is thinking "no big deal" the first time your horse nibbles at you or your clothing. Letting it go tells your horse he can do it again. If you keep petting your horse during the nibbling, you are actively encouraging this. To keep this from taking place, be mindful of your own proximity & body language with respect to your horse. So, try not to let yourself slip into these habits. Pet your horse consciously with intention, & be aware of his responses. If your horse keeps nudging at you anyway, whatever you do, do not react with aggression. If you swat, your horse is going to think, "Yay, playtime!" You will then be dealing with a frisky horse that is really going to go in for a bite. Either 1-distance yourself from the horse calmly, or 2engage, but in a way your horse doesn't expect. Perhaps instead of swatting your horse's nose, try rubbing it. This is something your horse won't mind at all & may alter his mental pattern.

Next month will be another installment of this important issue. Learning what provokes a horse to bite & how we can train our horse not to bite, will perhaps save you (or someone else) from a serious injury. ~Belinda Hebert

Ra's Round-Up ... Urban Influx & Ill Effects on Our Rural Areas

Enough is enough! Over the last few decades, Urban sprawl along with land use changes, has continued to force horse activities out of Miami-Dade County. Last year, the Univ. of Fla. completed a study on our agriculture industry in Miami-Dade. They found that if we keep losing agricultural land at our current rate, agriculture will not be viable in a few years. That should alarm all of us. It is time for our club to join forces with other organizations & stop this trend.

The largest threat to our equestrian community is a proposed county ordinance that removes a lot of regulations that are currently in place to ensure the tranquility of our rural area. Our state has a generous Agritourism statute/law which prevents our local governments from adopting any ordinance that would overshadow the state's allowances. Unfortunately, the proposed amendment changes will allow activities on agriculture lands that are **not allowed** by our state regulations. These uses would not have to be "ancillary (directly connected) to and directly supportive of agriculture". Some of these activities would include, ATV rentals, water parks, mini golf, outdoor concerts, up to 3 food trucks per property, zip lining, bounce house parks & pub games. The ordinance will prevent the county's ability to ensure the activities are part of a farm operation & remove their ability to enforce the regulations.

These prohibited activities are already happening. There are people getting kicked out of their barns so the owner can convert the barn into a wedding/party venue. We are suffering from extremely loud music, train horns, screaming DJs & firework shows. The ATV rental tours are aggravating farmers, which forces the landowner to blockade some of the dirt roads & **our** access to trails. Food, water, sewage, & zoning inspection/regulation/enforcement at these venues is questionable – which affects health, safety & our fragile ground water supply. Tons of litter, bottles & cans are being left from guests who are parking (illegally) on the sides of the roads.

We need to be heard! Let's stand together and convince our commissioners to reject these proposed ordinance changes. Up-dates on commission meetings will be sent to the membership via email. At the next meeting we need to all Trail Riders to attend will be 9-11am, Wed. Mar. 6. Location: Homestead Ag. Center on the SW corner of 288 St & 187 Ave in Homestead. 
cal rides and especially desensitizing events. We will hopefully have more activities in which ALL SFTR, including even the youngest juniors, can join in our practices & participate in the next season.
